International Director Candidacy Update

Hello Lions of Mississippi. First, let me again thank you for the honor you have given me to represent you as a candidate for International Director. So many of you continue to contact me and ask, "What can I do to help?" I haven't really been able to give an answer, but things are changing rapidly. Just to catch you up. On advice from Lions who have been through this process, it was suggested I request that my endorsed nomination, the nomination that you bestowed upon me in Batesville, be held until after the convention in Orlando this past July.

The reason? By the time the legal office at Lions had received the endorsement and verified my credentials as a viable candidate, there were over 17 candidates already verified and had spent time promoting their candidacy. As many of you know, Lions is so large and from so many areas of the world, that candidates are vetted to make sure they will represent our organization the way it needs and deserves to be represented. There was just no time for my candidacy to catch up in the few weeks between our state convention and the international convention. Those 17 candidates that had been vetted were vying for just 8 open positions.

Orlando has come and gone, my candidacy became active and we are now in the mix for Hong Kong in 2026. There will be even fewer available positions as the Lions population of the U.S. has continued to drop in correlation to the rest of the world. Hopefully we will get this reversed soon.

The first chance we get to put forth a good image will be in Atlantic City for the USA / Canada forum. I have been asked, along with the other candidates attending, to be on stage and answer an unknown question to show my ability to

'think on the fly' when visiting districts if I am elected. I'll let you know how that went in the next issue. Remember that Mississippi has not had a candidate since PID Howard Jenkins over 20 years ago. It is past our time.

Funds are necessary to promote our cause, so if you or your club wishes to help support the campaign financially, please send to Mike Flynt at the state office and they will keep and monitor all funds. I want to thank our campaign committee and invite you to join if you wish to get in on the decision making part of the campaign. A special thanks to campaign chairman PCC James Wilkerson, and wishing him a continued speedy recovery from recent health issues.

Cackle for the Gold...

Last year 35 Lions Clubs in Mississippi gave \$0. If each of those clubs only gave \$200, that would increase \$7,000. Last year personal contributions, through Avery McKinley Awards, added up to \$4,670. Using the incentive of 100% Club pins, the figure could be \$12,500.00. The previous time this incentive was used \$11,450 was raised. Last year, Lights for Sight contributions totaled \$1,875. If each Lions Club gave 2 Lights for Sight (One Honorarium and one Memorial) the figure could be \$4,000. The First ever drawdown at State Convention netted \$3,200. With a little effort we should be able double it. 20 Guns in 20 Days Raffle gave 10% of the net proceeds to White Cane for \$4,850. Increase the net proceeds to \$60,000 and White Cane grows another Chickens in 20 Minutes Raffle at State Convention should net \$3,000.

Facebook birthday fundraisers gave \$33

last year. If all 24 Trustees held a fundraiser on their Birthday for \$200, the total could be \$4,800. Imagine what one member per Lions Club could do?

Last year, at State Convention, the silent auction raised \$817. By bringing quality items of interest and money to bid, we should be able to match the average on the previous 4 State Conventions, \$1,936. Last Year Lion Sight Foundation Pin sales was \$0. Matching the average of the previous 4 years, we could raise \$200. ACH Contributions last year were \$1,675. ACH is drafts from personal banking accounts. If one Lion in each club gave \$20 a month we could realize \$17,525.

Our total increase could be \$45,916. If we add that to last years total of \$96,541, we could shatter last year's total and raise \$142,457 for this year's White Cane campaign.


